The Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron is a "child friendly" environment and hostsa variety of events, activities and programs throughout the year for children and young people which include Members and non-members.

1. Our Values

The following values reflect and support the culture within the RQYS that we are committed to in promoting the safety and wellbeing of children and young people:

- 1.1. We value the importance of a child's or young person's participation in decisions affecting them and take these decisions seriously;
- 1.2. Our actions, intentions and efforts support a child safe environment;

Each employee, volunteer, member, support staff and sailor treat each other with respect and promote being a good example in all aspects of Child Safety.

2. Statement of Commitment

The Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron ("RQYS") is committed to the safety and well-being of children and protecting them from harm while present on the Squadron's grounds. This statement of commitment includes our sailing activities and special events involving children and young people.

3. Code of Conduct

4. Recruitment, Selection, Training and Management

7. Risk Management Plan for High Risk Activities

- 7.1. Employees, coaches, support staff and volunteers have a high likelihood of being in close proximity to children, and have a high likelihood of interacting with children and young people as a part of their employment/volunteering role and therefore will be required to hold a Blue Card if they are over the age of 18;
- 7.2. Once that assessment is done, ensuring that a Working with Children Check is undertaken for any group identified in the Risk Assessment process;
- **7.3.** Have discussions about child and youth safety as a part of our WHS meetings and training sessions;
- **7.4.** Please refer to the Risk Assessment Management Plan for Child and Young People Safety (Appendix 1). Risk is assessed in three Levels: Low, Moderate and High.

8. Managing Compliance with the Blue Card System

- **8.1.** RQYS follows and complies with the direction of the Queensland Government Blue Card Services <u>https://www.qld.gov.au/law/laws-regulated-industries-and-accountability/queensland-laws-and-regulations/regulated-industries-and-licensing/blue-card-services</u>
- **8.2.** A register of all Blue Card Holders either Staff or Volunteers is held by RQYS, however no documentation relating to this register is held on site as directed by Blue Card Services.

9. Communication and Support

9.1. Informing employees, coaches, support staff and volunteers during inductions about the child safe policies and procedures of the organisation, including a definition within their role description of how this duty of care is executed and their mandatory/ethical reporting obligations for suspected child abuse and ensuring staff have a clear understanding of acceptable/ unacceptable behaviour.

10. Our Approach

10.1. The RQYS uses a variety of strategies to ensure the safety of children and young people. These strategies include:

- a. Understanding the different types of child abuse and behaviours:
- b. Unacceptable behaviour towards a child or young person, for example providing alcohol to a young person under 18 or grooming behaviour
- c. Physical or emotional abuse
- d. Neglect
- e. Sexual abuse
- f. Assessing the risks associated with the variety of individuals that may be present at the Squadron at any given time and how they, in the execution of their roles, may have interactions with children and young people;
- g. Assessing the risks to identify and mitigate potential areas of risk to a child within the Squadron's environs.
